

Fact Sheet: Ontario's Doctor Shortage

DID YOU KNOW?

At least 2.3 million Ontarians do not have regular access to primary care.

- The shortage is especially acute in northern and rural areas
- Communities in northern Ontario are actively recruiting more than 350 physicians, including more than 200 family doctors, according to the Northern Ontario School of Medicine University
- More than 2,500 physicians are needed in Ontario (according to HealthForceOntario)
- Half of the physicians in northern Ontario are expected to retire in the next five years
- 40% of physicians are considering retiring in Ontario

Ontario's doctor shortage has existed for decades, although the population grows in size and age each year.

- Ontario has 2.8 physicians for every 1,000 people
- Compared to other countries, Canada ranks 23rd out of 32 OECD (Organization for Economic Co-operation and Development) countries in doctor-to-population ratio
- The proportion of Ontario seniors is projected to increase to 22.2 per cent or 20 million people by 2046.
